### Something Different for the Spring Garden ...

Have you ever grown alliums? Most people are familiar with the huge purple blooms that when dried resemble an exploding fireworks. However alliums come in many sizes and colors. There is a short 4 "one with yellow blooms that is perfect for rock gardens and borders. And of course there is the 4' tall variety with huge purple blooms. They bloom through spring into mid summer and contribute great texture to the landscape and to cut bouquets. They prefer well-drained soil and sun. One of the reasons I like alliums is that the deer do not like to eat them. Maybe they taste like their cousin, the onion.

*Puschkinia libanotica* is another choice for early spring blooms. The dainty blue blooms are attractive in a bed and especially charming when they are naturalized. Imagine a light blue carpet spreading out under your shade trees next spring.
